To quote Alice Cooper (for those of you who remember him), "School is out for the Summer." It is now time for us to work diligently to prepare for next year. When the students return, it will be to a newly refurbished "old gym". We will have to change the name because it will not look like the "old gym" anymore. Even though kids and teachers are home for the summer, the Central Office and custodial staffs will be here throughout the summer. Summer office hours are Monday-Thursday from 7:00-1:00. Friday we will be closed. July 18-29, the school is closed for maintenance and repairs.

Summer school dates are listed in the "Dates to Remember" section on the next page. Student summer school times are from 8:00 AM – 11:00 AM on the dates listed.

Below is a repeat information, but it is news that definitely is worth repeating:

After careful thought and deliberation, the Board has determined that they will pursue an operational sharing agreement with Wapsie Valley Community Schools for the position of Superintendent; the agreement will be for one year, 2016 – 2017, and will be reviewed by each Board over the course of the coming school year before any determination is made regarding the length of an agreement beyond the first year. Several factors lead to this decision:

- Uncertain increases in school finance at the state level have impacted schools across the state. Increases of 1.25% and 2.25% in the past two years, coupled with decreasing enrollment, have resulted in the need for districts to reduce costs and increase revenues. Sharing staff members between districts reduces costs and the state provides financial incentives for sharing certain positions, one of which is superintendent.
- Many Iowa districts are sharing superintendents, or have superintendents who also serve as building principal. Large districts like Clear Lake and Mason City shared a superintendent for several years, and local districts like Nashua-Plainfield and Clarksville, Tripoli and Starmont and North and Gladbrook-Reinbeck Tama share (or will be sharing) a superintendent. There are many examples for districts to follow across the state.
- Districts share superintendents and maintain a unique identity. This doesn't mean we will become more like Wapsie, or vice versa. We can share good ideas, but sharing a super- intendent <u>does</u> <u>not</u> mean that districts are merging. Both Boards feel it is an important step in maintaining identity without the threat of consolidation. Both Boards appreciate that about the sharing agreement.

 The availability of a neighboring district. From a geographic standpoint, it makes the most sense as transportation can be minimized, and time can be maximized.

Although this will be a process, the Boards, Administration, and I are committed to doing the work that will help this agreement be a success for kids and staff in both districts. Will there be changes that accompany this? Yes, of course, but with good people in the right positions, we are confident this can be a productive agreement. As more information becomes available, the Board will pass it along to the staff and community. Dunkerton is also looking at other positons to operationally share so that we can take advantage of the shared workload and the financial incentives the state offers. One last tidbit to share before I close --The Board has decided to move their regular monthly meetings to the first Monday of the month starting in June.

Children's Author Visits Dunkerton Elementary

Ryan Sloth, or "Coach Sloth" as he prefers to be called, visited Dunkerton Elementary School on Friday, April 29 to read a few of his books and speak to students in kindergarten through 5th grade. Author of such books as "Hank the Bully" and "Sammy Sloth Sports Superstar," Sloth brought positive messages to Dunkerton students about how to handle bullying and to pursue whatever dreams they have in life.

Coach Sloth is a former member of the Iowa State Cyclone football team and has also played and coached arena football in Iowa along with a few other places. He has also appeared as a football player in some popular movies, such as We Are Marshall and The Amazing Spiderman.
