SINA and DINA lists. Overall there are 12 categories in which we are monitored for compliance. This is at a time when these standards are being raised at the fastest levels since NCLB started in 2000, and the next step is 100% of our students must meet proficiency levels.

Despite all of this, we met in 11 of the 12 categories! As a District, we are **not** on any DINA lists, not even the DINA watch list. The secondary is on SINA 2 level in Math and in delay for Reading, and the elementary is on delay for Math and on nothing for Reading. Yes, you read that right, the elementary is not even on the watch list in Reading.

That is nothing short of fantastic! This is a tribute to the teachers, students, and staff at Dunkerton Schools. In a time when compliance and proficiency levels are climbing at the fastest rate in the history of the NCLB, we met in 11 of the 12 categories. This is a wonderful testimony to the hard work and effort the students and staff are putting forth in our classrooms. CONGRATULATIONS TO THE STAFF AND STUDENTS ON A JOB WELL DONE!!

Congratulations to the Raider Cross Country Team which ended the season ranked 13<sup>th</sup> in the state in Class 1A. They won the Conference Championship at the HS level, and Ben Reams was conference champion at the JH level. The team also finished 5<sup>th</sup> out of 22 teams at the district competition, which featured some of the best runners and teams in the state. Jordan Yessak qualified for the state meet (he finished 3rd out of 162). Congratulations to Coach Thompson and the Cross Country Team on a great season.

Our certified enrollment is finally finished and turned in to the state. We will not know for sure what our numbers will be until after this goes to press, but we are very close to being the same number as last year. Good news is that we are not shrinking, bad news is that our certified number was down 12 last year from the previous year. I am looking on the bright side and am glad that our number did not decline, as most schools in the state are facing falling enrollment. Over 78% of the schools in Iowa are experiencing falling enrollment. I am glad we are not one of them.

Thank you for your support in making Dunkerton a great place to live and Dunkerton Schools a great place to be a kid! As always, thanks to the taxpayers of our community for supporting the school, we couldn't do it without you! Our doors are always open, so stop in anytime for a visit.

#### A Memorable Year for Cross Country

With 10 HS Boys, 5 HS girls, and 5 JH runners, we had one of the biggest squads ever. Highlights included the boys winning the conference championship, and the girls finishing a solid 4th. Ben Reams was the winner of 2 races this year, a 2 mile and 1 mile race and was JH conference champ. Alicia Wilder was runner-up at conference and set a new JH record in the 2 mile race. Peter Kauten, Collin Conger and Sam Steffen made the top 20 list, and Alecia Kimball made the top 20 list for girls. Jordan Yessak had 10 top 10 races and was conference runner-up. Jordan, John Davis. Peter Kauten, and Emilee Miller were named all-conference. Jordan finished 3<sup>rd</sup> at Districts and qualified for state, with the boys having a solid performance of 5<sup>th</sup> out of 27 teams. The boys were ranked for the 1st time ever at 13th for over 3 weeks. Jordan reached 13th individually and may climb a few places after beating 4 runners ranked ahead of him at Districts. With 5 of the top 7 runners coming back, we should have an excellent team next fall. #### 11<sup>th</sup> Grade English

As we are finishing the first trimester, the juniors are working hard to finish the novel, Catcher in the Rye. We have been analyzing the different chapters, discussing tone, and learning about the origin of the title (because it's so odd)! The students are busy learning how to use quotations correctly (and cite them) and how to use figurative language. They created posters portraying the literal and figurative meanings of things that Holden says throughout the book. Students have also created "Instagram posts" from characters in the book. They turned out really well and are hung up in my room if anyone is interested in viewing them.



"Brain Breaks" have recently been added to our class routine in order to break up the period and give the students a brief "off time." This has worked wonderfully – the students enjoy getting to play Rock-Paper-Scissors in the middle of class!

#### 12th Grade English

Seniors are working incredibly hard on their final projects – a Multigenre Research Project. For these projects, students were allowed to choose their own topic. Topics vary from NFL teams to singers to Walt Disney to Mathews Bows. Most have really delved into their projects.



Jacob Cox is creating a Patriotopoly – he's Modge Podged pictures and names of Patriot players onto the board and cards to create a Monopoly board that he and his family will be able to use in the future. Morgan Finck is busy creating several hilarious artifacts for her topic, Channing Tatem, including short stories, a eulogy, and a picture book. Bailey Epling is creating a variety of artifacts for her topic, Jennie Finch, including a brochure to a softball camp. Lane Johnson chose a topic that he is passionate about – Mathews, Inc. In September the second grade students attended the Discovery Program at Cattle Conaress sponsored by lowa State Extension. Students spent the morning in small group sessions learning about chickens, dairv cattle, and sheep. In the afternoon the students attended a workshop on horses as well as a cattle show. The class enjoyed touring the petting zoo and animal barns and getting to touch (and smell!) the cattle, hogs, chickens, horses, rabbits, and sheep. This school was located northwest of Dunkerton and donated to Cattle Congress by members of the David Magee family. This was the first time that David's grandson, Malaki, had visited the schoolhouse.

#### Fall Activities Update

I thought I would take a moment and give an update on all of the Fall Activities that have taken place this year. It has been a great season for many of our activities. Our High School Volleyball team had one of their best seasons in recent years as they compiled a record of 16-8. They also won the North Tama tournament. The kids played well together all season long and have taken strides to improve.

Our Cross Country teams had an outstanding season, as well. Our girls' team finished fourth at the first ever conference meet held at Wartburg College. Our boys team won the meet and are the first ever Conference lowa Star Cross Country Champions. Our boys also broke into the rankings for the first time in many years as they got to as high as #13 overall. They came up just short at the District Meet at Nashua Plainfield finishing 5<sup>th</sup> (top 3 teams advance). Jordan Yessak did qualify for the state meet as he finished 3<sup>rd</sup> at the District Meet (top 10 runners advance). At the state meet in Fort Dodge, Jordan finished 33<sup>rd</sup> out of 134 runners. Jordan also was ranked throughout the season getting to as high as #12.

The football team ended their season with a 2-7 record.

Our Jazz Choir has the opportunity to sing the National Anthem at the State Volleyball Tournament next week. Our Marching Band had the opportunity to perform at UNI on Saturday as well. Our Fine Arts programs have really developed some wonderful talent.

#### Take Charge of Your Body

Take Charge of Your Body presentations will be made in K-6 classrooms the week of November 10. The "Take Charge of Your Body" Program is a sexual abuse prevention program which was developed in 1985 by professionals (teachers, school counselors, social workers) from the Cedar Valley.

This program is presented in elementary schools by trained staff and volunteers from the Family and Children's Council. *The primary goal of the program is to teach children about safety with touching and how to respond to unsafe situations that some children find themselves facing.* 

Sexual abuse prevention is NOT a one-time, heart-to-heart talk with children about stranger danger. Prevention MUST be on-going throughout a child's maturation, and messages MUST come from all areas of a child's life, including home, school, church, and other community groups.

We believe that teaching sexual abuse prevention at school, along with parents reinforcing this message at home, is the most effective means of protecting children from sexual abuse.

An informational parent meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 4, beginning at 6 p.m. in the ICN room. We invite you to attend this meeting to learn more about issues addressing sexual abuse prevention at home, as well as learn about the "Take Charge of Your Body" Program.
